Good Shepherd educators from across India gathered in Bangalore on June 6–7, 2025, for two enriching days of self-awareness and leadership growth. Thirty Sisters and key school leaders, facilitated by Sr Beena CL, Sashi Natarajan, and Sushma Antony, courageously looked into the "Leadership Mirror" to reflect on who they are and what they offer as changemakers in education.

Participants undertook the MBTI assessment, guided by certified practitioner Sashi Natarajan and the Anahat team. This journey of self-discovery deepened their understanding of individual preferences, enhancing communication, teamwork, and leadership.

### Students Celebrate Nature with Green Spirit:

Students from Grades 1 to 6, dressed in green, celebrated their love for nature with enthusiasm. The special assembly included a gratitude song, short speeches on protecting the environment, and a pledge to care for the Earth.

Ms. Sarah Mohan, an ecologist, explained how insects, bees, butterflies, and birds keep nature balanced, inspiring students to keep their surroundings clean. An interactive session sparked curiosity and questions.

She then led an eco-walk, guiding students to observe local plants, insects, and birds. The event ended with students planting saplings — a meaningful step toward a greener planet.



## **NEW HOPE FOR CHILDREN**

### Children's Parliament brings New Hope to Ouguri, Assam

In Ouguri, a remote village in Assam, the launch of a Children's Parliament has brought meaningful change, introducing social engagement to a community long centered on agriculture and daily livelihoods. Until recently, villagers had little exposure to organized development efforts. That began to change when local volunteers and educators set up the Children's Parliament — a platform for children to voice concerns, suggest solutions, and engage in community life. Initially, many parents hesitated and questioned its relevance, but awareness campaigns and orientation sessions gradually helped them see its value. Through discussions and learning about rights, the community realized how empowering children fosters informed, confident, and responsible citizens.





### Children's Parliament - Leadership Training, Amaravathi



A two-day leadership training for Children's Parliament members was held by GSC Amravathi on 23rd May and 12th June 2025 in Patipandla village. Facilitated by Mr. Ravi Kumar and project staff, the sessions built communication, teamwork, and confidence. Mr. Ravi led interactive discussions on leadership qualities like fairness, listening, courage, decisiveness, and motivation. Children worked in groups to present their insights on leadership responsibilities. The program ended with an inspiring talk by Mr. Srinivas Rao, Mandal Revenue Officer, who urged children to support one another and grow as inclusive, responsible leaders, impressing on them the value of early leadership.



### Little Hands, Big Impact: World Environment Day

On 6th June 2025, two villages in Ouguri came together to celebrate World Environment Day — led by children and grounded in the spirit of sustainability. Under the theme "Our Earth, Our Future," children organized activities to raise environmental awareness and promote eco-friendly habits.

Bringing saplings from home, they planted trees like neem, guava, and jackfruit across school grounds, public spaces, and water sources — greening their surroundings while inspiring care for nature and conservation within the community.

# WORLD DAY AGAINST CHILD LABOUR OBSERVED

On 12-13 June 2025, the Good Shepherd Sisters and partners-inmission marked World Day Against Child Labour in Mangalagiri, Tadepalli, and Thullur, with 130 stakeholders, NGOs, and government officials. A government representative spoke on the forms and harms of child labour, urging society to protect vulnerable children. Sr. Vidya, Child Protection Project Coordinator, shared the 2025 theme: "Progress is clear, but there's more to do", calling for stronger efforts. Sr. Mercy George, Local Leader, highlighted the plight of children in hazardous work. Awareness posters displayed, reinforcing the collective responsibility to end child labour.



# FARMERS GAIN INSIGHTS ON SOIL HEALTH AT JNKVV EXPOSURE PROGRAM

On June 13, 2025, 52 beneficiaries (26 men and 26 women) from nearby villages, along with Good Shepherd Convent Garratola staff, visited Jawaharlal Nehru Krishi Vishwavidyalaya (JNKVV), Jabalpur, for an exposure program on sustainable agriculture and soil health.

Welcomed by Dr. Dinkar Prasad Sharma, University Director, the group heard Dr. V.S. Divyadi emphasize the vital farmer-soil relationship: "You need a farmer every day, and he needs the soil." Participants learned that soil is a sacred, life-giving resource, beyond just a growing medium, and that modern practices have harmed this bond.

Farmers were taught to identify nutrient deficiencies, select fields wisely, and diversify income through allied activities. The visit raised awareness, inspired sustainable practices, and built capacity. Farmers expressed eagerness to apply their new knowledge of soil management, productivity, and conservation in their fields.

The day began with a lively welcome dance an d words of appreciation for the resilience of domestic workers. Fr. Praveen Montero, Advocate and Director of Yuva Jyoti, spoke on workers' rights and social security. Sr. Philo outlined welfare schemes, and social worker

Mr. Sathik Bhai pledged help in securing essential documents.

Fr. Sameer and Sr. Pushpa Louis, Provincial, urged the women to claim their rights confidently. The inspiring, celebratory event raised awareness of domestic workers' struggles, empowering them to move forward with dignity, equality, and hope.

# WWVOICES OF THE CHILDREN

### My Journey with the Bharathiyar Children's Parliament

I'm R. Liya, a Class 6 student from South Kadu village. With my friends, we formed the Bharathiyar Children's Parliament — a space to learn, lead, and grow. I was proud to be elected Deputy Prime Minister and took my role seriously.

Being part of the Parliament has transformed me. I've learned time management, caring for nature, saving, respecting others, and speaking confidently. I now value education and am eager to keep learning and contributing to my community.

# Collective action nurtures self-confidence

The Warriors Children's Parliament of Munagodu, Amravathi, held regular meetings but struggled without a proper venue. Guided by the Parliament team, members drafted an official request, signed by all 27 (11 boys, 16 girls). A delegation of seven, led by their leaders, presented it to the village elders. Impressed by their initiative, the elders granted them use of the church premises. Since then, the Warriors have joyfully conducted their meetings in this safe, welcoming space, strengthening their teamwork and confidence.

### Courage Beyond the Screen: A Girl's Brave Stand against Cybercrime

I'm Reshma (name changed), 19, from the Kathakri tribal community in Beed, Maharashtra, and a member of the Shraddha adolescent girls' group. I want to help other girls stay safe from cybercrime. I was harassed and blackmailed by a married man, but with a social worker's help, I filed a police complaint, informed my family, and he was caught. I'm grateful to the Good Shepherd Sisters for raising awareness and supporting me to act bravely and protect myself in time.

# "Many things may attract our eye – but only follow what attracts our hearts."

I'm Nithyasree, an 8th standard student from vibrant Pallipatti village, Salem. Being unanimously elected Prime Minister of the Kamarajar Children's Parliament was a proud moment that inspired my dream of becoming an IPS officer.

As Prime Minister, I confidently lead monthly meetings, interact with officials, and address community issues. I've become more organized and aware, and I now read newspapers daily to stay informed and guide my team. Together, we attend evening classes, learning and growing as a motivated group.

### "Empowered by Education, Driven by Dreams"

I'm Thokala Sandhya Rani, 24, from Jupudi village, Amaravathi. Growing up poor, I dreamed of helping my parents and being independent. After my B.Sc, I felt lost — no English, no computer skills, no direction.

Joining the Good Shepherd Convent's free Computer and Spoken English training changed everything. Patient teachers helped me overcome my fears and gain confidence.

By the end, I felt transformed. With their support, I got a Data Entry Operator job at the Andhra Pradesh Secretariat, earning ₹35,000.

### SHEPHERDING LIGHT DAWNS AT AYANDUR

On 4 June 2025, the Good Shepherd Convent inaugurated its new mission in Ayandur, Villupuram District, as part of the Chennai centenary and Salem silver jubilee celebrations. Inspired by St. Mary Euphrasia's belief that "each soul is worth more than the entire world," the mission aims to serve the rural poor through compassion, accompaniment, and community engagement.

Born of dialogue with local leaders, including Fr. Sahaya Celestine and Mr. Antony Dass, and blessed by the Archbishop of Pondicherry-Cuddalore, the inauguration coincided with the St. Antony's Church flag festival. Province leaders, dignitaries, and villagers welcomed the sisters as agents of transformation.

Honouring local daughters-turned-sisters, Sr. Arockiamary and Sr. Monica D'Silva, the mission was entrusted to Sr. Vinnarasi and Sr. Rubi Kala. The sisters, called "the heartbeat of Christ" in Ayandur, commit to restoring dignity and hope through pastoral care, empowerment, and the Good Shepherd's charism.











### MEDIA INTERACTION PROGRAM OPPORTUNITY VILLAGE, NEPAL



The Media Interaction Program, organized by Opportunity Village Nepal under its Anti-Human Trafficking Project on 23rd June 2025, aimed to strengthen media engagement in addressing internal trafficking in Kathmandu Valley's Adult Entertainment Sector (AES). The program encouraged ethical, survivor-centered journalism to raise awareness, influence policy, and protect vulnerable women and girls.

Presentations highlighted trafficking trends, and survivors' experiences, gaps protections, urging the media to adopt a human rights-focused, trauma-informed approach. Youth from the project shared powerful testimonies of exploitation in AES establishments, while experts stressed the importance of sensitive, confidential storytelling that upholds survivors' dignity.






### MUCH GRATITUDE AND APPRECIATION


