HUMANITARIAN FOCUS

» Ending the year with hope and action: GS Mission continues across borders as 7 Nepalese survivors rescued from Bihar



Opportunity Village Nepal joined hands with KIN India, GSIF Nepal, Nepal Police, and the Embassy of Nepal in New Delhi to rescue and bring back seven survivors of violence from India. The group included five boys who had been forced into child labour, a girl who was deceived into marriage and then left behind, and an adult who sought shelter in India after her family abandoned her.

On 31 December, the children were reunited with their families at the Province Police Office in Madhesh Province. The Deputy Inspector General of Nepal Police spoke at the event and emphasised the need to report missing children quickly so they can be rescued in time.

Action-Oriented

» 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence: Three Walls

The Peer Support Group (PSG) organised an interactive exhibition titled "Three Walls" to raise awareness of forms of violence often overlooked. Participants took part in hands-on sessions that helped them understand survivors' experiences and encouraged empathy and awareness. The exhibition included three themed walls: The Emotional Wall – Voices That Must Be Heard, which shared real stories and testimonies; The Silence Wall – Break the Silence, where participants wrote about violence they had experienced, witnessed, or heard about; and The Pledge Wall – "I Commit To...", which invited people to make personal promises to help create a safer and more supportive community.



STRONG & INCLUSIVE

» Celebrating Dignity, Rights, and Joy: Mottukal's Commitment to Women and Children



Between 25 November and 10 December 2025, Mottukal held a series of awareness sessions on Gender-Based Violence (GBV) for men and women in the outreach slum areas of Nungambakkam, Chennai. Girls and community members learned about dignity,

personal safety, equality, and the basic rights of every person. These interactive sessions encouraged participants to recognise injustice and to stand up for themselves and others.

» International Day of Peace 2025



The International Day of Peace 2025 was celebrated at the Good Shepherd Convent in Salem by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, Partners-in-Mission, and members of Amaithi Sangamam(Peace Collective) under the UN theme "Act Now for a Peaceful World."

The program honoured the legacy of St. Mary Euphrasia Pelletier, whose compassion and sense of justice continue to inspire peace efforts.

A lively Peace Rally, started by Hindu, Christian, and Muslim religious leaders, brought together people from ten villages to speak out against caste discrimination, religious hatred, and gender-based violence. After the rally, a public meeting at the Convent Campus featured interfaith leaders and social activists who spoke about constitutional values, harmony, and the shared responsibility for peace. Children and women gave cultural performances that highlighted inclusion and peaceful living, ending with a call to build peace through daily acts of respect, dialogue, and kindness.

➤ Unfurling Dreams and Nurturing Safe Spaces

On 28 October 2025, the International Day of the Girl was celebrated at the Child Protection Home, Opportunity Village Nepal, by the Girls' Advocate Club under the theme "UDAAN – Unfurling Dreams and Nurturing Safe Spaces." The programme began with a prayer and a welcome by Pabitra and Sristina. Mrs Carola (RFL Donor) and Ms Racidi from SWI attended, encouraging the young advocates. Advocate Anita highlighted the importance of safe, inclusive spaces for girls' leadership. Through art, storytelling, dance, and an installation symbolising freedom, the girls shared their dreams and challenges. Sr. Anthonia concluded by encouraging the girls to stand up for their rights and continue creating safe spaces.



➤ International Day of the Girl Child Celebration at Ouguri, Assam



The International Day of the Girl Child was celebrated at Don Bosco School Ground, Ouguri, Assam, by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd with support from NGOs, the Child Welfare Committee, and Don Bosco Fathers. The event brought together 405 participants from ten villages. Through speeches, cultural performances, dances, and awareness sessions, the programme promoted girls' rights, education, empowerment, and gender equality. Children showcased their talents and dreams, while speakers encouraged parents to support girls equally. The celebration inspired the community to value and protect girls for a stronger society.

➤ Celebrating Children's Day with Joy and Learning

Children's Day burst with excitement on 14 and 15 November, as 369 children from ten villages gathered to celebrate. Schools joined in, and each event began with a heartfelt welcome from village animators. Staff shared the wisdom of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru and the importance of children's rights. In some villages, the air was filled with laughter and music as children performed dances, songs, and skits and played games. Special guests, including teachers and Sarpanches, applauded the children's energy and encouraged them to pursue education and seek support when needed. The festivities ended with treats, gifts, and, in some villages, a community lunch.



The celebration created joyful memories and reminded everyone that children are the heart of hope and happiness.

➤ Mangalagiri Site – International Day of the Girl Child 2025 & Children's Parliament Training



The Good Shepherd Sisters observed the International Day of the Girl Child on 9 October 2025 at the Pedakakani MPDO Office, Mangalagiri, with 140 participants from government offices, NGOs, media, and children. The theme, "The Girl I Am, the Change I Lead," focused on girls' rights, education, empowerment, and protection. Speakers addressed child marriage, cyber safety, health, gender equality, and legal rights under CM and POCSO Acts, encouraging girls to pursue education and report abuse.

Young advocates were recognised for their leadership and creativity. On 18 October 2025, a Children's Parliament training for 73 members strengthened children's leadership, advocacy skills, and commitment to addressing child labour, child marriage, and abuse, nurturing confident future leaders.

» Joint Action with NGOs and GOs during Child Rights Week



As part of Child Rights Week, an awareness session was held at Maria Bombina Convent Hall for 72 students from IDC, Comba, and Bhatia. Facilitated by Sr. Jeryssa of the Holy Family NGO and Dr. Junsa Mudras from the Child Welfare Committee, the session focused on child rights, safety, helplines, and seeking support. Lively discussions and a musical drama by students highlighted real challenges children face, making the learning engaging and meaningful. The session empowered children with knowledge, confidence, and awareness of available support systems.



» Child Rights Week –14th to 21st November: For Every Child, Every Right

Child Rights Week blossomed with a series of heartfelt events, shining a spotlight on children's voices and dreams. Children's Day overflowed with enthusiasm, celebrating love, protection, and respect for every child. Games, cultural activities, and joyful moments created a safe haven where children felt seen and heard. The Mottukal team joined the "Walk for Children," marching alongside the District Child Protection Office, Child Welfare Committees, and others, as their slogans echoed the call for child rights and protection.



These efforts continue to nurture respect, equality, and compassion, strengthening the centre's promise to empower girls and uplift the whole community.

CARE FOR CREATION INITIATIVES

➤ Good Shepherd Convent School, Karjat



Good Shepherd Convent School, Karjat, promoted environmental responsibility through its Care for Creation Initiative, actively engaging students in eco-friendly actions. A key highlight was the "Pedal for Planet" Rally, where students from Std. VIII to X rode decorated bicycles with messages like "Go Green – Breathe Clean" and "Save Water – Save Life."

Supported by the Rotary Club of Karjat and appreciated by the Karjat Police, the rally included tree planting and public awareness. Other initiatives included Adopt a Tree, plastic waste collection and recycling, environmental art by younger students, and sapling planting funded through recycled materials. Eco-themes were integrated into the Annual Sports Meet and Christmas

celebrations, while a visit to a Mulberry Farm helped younger students connect with nature, nurturing responsible and committed Eco Warriors.



WALK FOR THE RIGHTS OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN

» International Human Rights Day 2025



On 10 December 2025, the Good Shepherd Sisters in Salem organised a "Walk for the Rights of Women and Children" to mark International Human Rights Day, themed "Human Rights: Our Everyday Essentials."

The rally brought together Sisters, government officials, police, legal experts, students, and community members. Marching from Masinayakanpatty Bus Stop to the Ayothiyapattinam Block Development Office, participants carried placards and raised slogans for dignity, equality, and child protection. Speakers highlighted gender-based violence, child abuse, and the need for community engagement, legal awareness, and ongoing advocacy. Media coverage strengthened the message, inspiring a shared commitment to uphold human rights daily.

» Stakeholder Consultation on Draft Legislation for Domestic Workers



The National Domestic Workers Movement (NDWM), Maharashtra, in collaboration with the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, organised a Stakeholder Consultation on the Draft Legislation for Domestic Workers at the Good Shepherd Provincialate, Nagpur, on 17 October 2025.

Titled "Advancing Rights and Protection for Domestic Workers," the consultation brought together domestic workers, legal experts, stakeholders, and civil society representatives to deliberate on a proposed legislative framework to ensure dignity, welfare, and social security for domestic workers.

WALK FOR THE RIGHTS OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN

The programme began with the lighting of the ceremonial lamp and a welcome by Sr. Pushpa Louis, Province Leader, Central East India/Nepal. Sr. Kala facilitated the session, and Sr. Christy ICM outlined the objectives, stressing the recognition of domestic work as dignified labour deserving fair wages, safe working conditions, and social protection. Ms Chitra, Advocate, NDWM, presented key elements of the draft legislation, including governance, welfare provisions, and grievance redressal. Adv. Sr. Philomina Pichapally explained the broader legal context and protections.

Adv. P.K. Satyanathan, Senior High Court Lawyer and Legal Advisor to the Archdiocese of Nagpur, highlighted humane treatment, inclusion in the organised sector, registration, social security, Shram Cards, and strict prohibition of child and bonded labour.

Adv. Manjusha Giradkar shared information on welfare schemes, including the Ladli Bahen Yojana and Shram Cards.

Domestic workers, Mrs Fulkan and Mrs Josephine, shared their lived experiences and called for pensions, weekly holidays, bonuses, and minimum wages. Moderated by Sr. Pushpa Louis and Sr. Christy, the discussion generated key recommendations, including capacity-building for employers and workers, addressing emotional exploitation, ensuring financial security through pensions and social protection, inclusion of persons with disabilities, reference to the 2008 Draft Bill, and a provident fund with a standardised rate card.

The consultation concluded with a vote of thanks by Mrs Nirmala Kujur, marking a meaningful step toward stronger advocacy and legislation for domestic workers' rights and empowerment.



SANTA PROGRAMME 2025

Good Shepherd Schools, Chennai


The annual Santa Programme at Good Shepherd Schools, Chennai, was held on 6 December 2025 at St. John Eudes Hall, Junior Section Campus. The event aimed to spread joy among under privileged children while nurturing students' compassion and empathy.



Nearly 700 children, including 200 differently-abled children, participated in games, songs, dances, and dramas organised by students with the support of teachers, sisters, and volunteers. All children received gifts and a nutritious meal. A student- and parent-led Food Fest raised funds for the programme, making the celebration a heartfelt expression of sharing, inclusion, and meaningful connections.

Virtual Christmas Celebration – Mission Development Office (MDO), CEI, Nagpur

On 20 December 2025, the Mission Development Office, CEI Nagpur, hosted a joyful virtual Christmas celebration uniting Good Shepherd Sisters across eight Indian states via Zoom. Children from the Adolescent Girls Group and Children's Parliament performed dances, songs, mime, and carols in multiple languages, showcasing their talents and fostering togetherness despite the distance. Messages from Mr. Sanjay Barai, Sr. Louis Pushpa, Sr. Precilla, and Sr. Kala added warmth to the event. Supported by Mr. Nelson Benjamin and staff, the celebration highlighted the power of digital platforms to connect and share the festive spirit with beneficiaries and staff nationwide.



EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES THROUGH EXPOSURE VISITS

➤ Exposure Visits for Children's Parliament Members – Amaravathi Child Protection Project



The Amaravathi Child Protection Team organised exposure visits for 227 Children's Parliament members (109 boys, 118 girls) from 6th to 12th standard across Krosuru, Pedakurapadu, and Tadikonda Mandals. Accompanied by three village child protection representatives, the visits aimed to boost children's confidence and awareness of child protection systems, legal rights, and support services.

Children visited key institutions such as Sattenapalli Court, local police stations, the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), the Child Helpline (1098), the One Stop Centre, and the Child Welfare Committee. Police and judicial officials explained their roles and legal processes in ways that were motivating.

A highlight was the DCPU session on safe versus unsafe touch, featuring presentations, videos, and role-plays. The children's enthusiastic participation showed growing confidence and understanding.

These visits strengthened ties between community protection efforts and formal systems, empowering children to actively defend their rights and those of others. The Amaravathi Child Protection Team thanks all partners and supporters who made this possible.

➤ Exposure Visit for Women's Economic Justice Project – Chainpur, Jharkhand



On 17th December 2025, 65 participants from 13 villages gathered at Rani Urja Mandal Mahila Samiti, Raidih, for an inspiring exposure visit under the EJ SHG and CCSE projects. The day was filled with learning as resource persons shared practical insights on running cooperatives, managing solar power plants, and exploring income

generating activities such as animal husbandry, mushroom and vegetable farming, food processing, tailoring, and pet shops. Participants eagerly joined discussions, asked questions, and showed great enthusiasm for new ideas in solar energy and cooperative management. The session sparked interest in forming cooperatives and pursuing sustainable livelihoods. The day ended with heartfelt thanks and a shared meal, leaving everyone motivated for the journey ahead.

VOICE FROM CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENT

A Journey of Confidence and Leadership

My name is Bipul Narzary from Goibari village, Ouguri, part of the Bwlwgwra Children's Parliament. Before its formation, I was shy and silent, with adults making decisions. When the Good Shepherd Sisters helped form the Children's Parliament, I became Prime Minister. This role taught me to speak confidently, listen, and respect others. I learned about education, health, safety, and unity, sharing these with community leaders who supported us. Now, I feel proud and responsible, using my leadership to help make our village safer and better for all children.



Improvement in Health and Education through Children's Parliament



My name is Jhameshwar Yadav, 11 years old, studying in 6th grade at Gorakhpur Government School, Darbaritola village.

As a child, I struggled with excess weight,

which affected my health and confidence, causing me to miss school and avoid activities. When the Good Shepherd Sisters started the Children's Parliament in our village, I joined the Pragati Bal Sabha with encouragement from the Community Facilitator. Guided by Mrs Prabha Saiyam and Mr Manakram, I learned about health, nutrition, exercise, and hygiene. By following their advice, I lost 12 kg, gained energy, and became active and confident. Now, I attend school regularly, enjoy games, and share my knowledge with others. This program has improved the health and confidence of many children in our village.

VOICES FROM CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENT

Voices from Children's Parliament, Mangalagiri, Andhra Pradesh

The Good Shepherd program taught me about rights and community issues, helping me confidently approach authorities and lead alongside Vijaya M. Our group successfully addressed serious cases, ensuring justice. The Children's Parliament has helped me grow and make a difference.



Empowering Children through Health, Nutrition, and Children's Parliament

I am Lakshmi Ogare from Jodhi Tola village, a member of the Jana Vikas Children's Parliament. Before, children had little say in decisions that affected their lives and lacked awareness of their rights. Thanks to the Sisters of the Good Shepherd's Health and Nutrition programs and Child Rights education, we learned about healthy habits, hygiene, menstrual care, and our rights to education, health, and protection. The Children's Parliament, with elected leaders, now actively discusses school facilities, nutrition, and safety. Our voices are heard by teachers, parents, and authorities, resulting in positive change. This program has empowered us to become confident leaders and active community members.



VOICE OF ADOLESCENT GIRLS

Report on Life Skill Education for Adolescent Girl



My name is Sakshi Tangse, 17 years old from Darbaritola village, studying in 9th grade at Kanya Higher Secondary School, Birsa. Before joining the Pragati Children's Parliament,

I was shy and unsure about my rights or speaking up. Becoming Prime Minister taught me confidence, leadership, and responsibility. Through Life Skill Education training by the Good Shepherd Sisters, I learned self-confidence, decision-making, emotional strength, and the importance of self-care and healthy relationships. These lessons transformed me—I'm now focused, brave, and ready to face challenges. I proudly share what I've learned with other children, empowering us all. This journey has given me hope and courage to build a brighter future for myself and my community.

I am Tanvi Jhanshar Aher from Palasdari village, Karjat. Despite difficulties and limited facilities, I loved studying and never lost interest. Supported by the Good Shepherd Sisters through the Chalice sponsorship, I completed the 12th standard and chose to serve my village. I work as a supplementary teacher, helping children with reading, writing, and math. I also completed a tailoring course and run a small business with my mother, selling forest products. I want to be independent and believe education can uplift individuals and communities. I'm grateful for the support that helped me serve and inspire others.



VOICE OF ADOLESCENT GIRLS

Fear to Freedom

My name is A. Suvarna. I am 16 years old and from Amaravathi, Andhra Pradesh. Because of financial problems, I had to stop studying after the 10th standard, even though I enjoyed learning.

Before I joined the Computer Literacy and Spoken English Course run by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, I was shy and unsure about my future. Through this course, I learned spoken English, basic computer skills, and important life skills.

I also gained the confidence to speak out against issues like child marriage. Now, I look ahead with hope, pride, and new dreams.



Empowered to Speak Up

I shared this knowledge with classmates and spoke about human rights violations in a video. This experience gave me the confidence to raise my voice for change. IMPACT STORIES

Application for CC Road through Children's Parliament in Salghat Village, Garratola, MP

The Children's Parliament of Salghat village took action to improve poor village roads, which became muddy and slippery during rains, making it hard for children to attend school. On 2nd October 2025, 8 boys and 22 girls submitted an application to the Gram Sabha requesting Cement Concrete (CC) roads. The Sarpanch, Mr. Barath Meravi, acknowledged their concerns, and the proposal was approved. By 20th December 2025, the new CC road was

completed, easing transportation and school attendance. Villagers thanked the MDO team, Good Shepherd Sisters, and staff. This shows how children's leadership can drive positive community change.



Chalice: Sriram Ramadevi



I am Sriram Ramadevi from a small town where opportunities were scarce. My parents worked hard, but financial struggles made education difficult. I almost gave up my dream until I discovered the Good Shepherd Digital Hub in Dolas Nagar, Mangalagiri. With affordable training, a strict study schedule, and support from the Good Shepherd Sisters, I improved my skills and prepared for interviews. Despite challenges, my determination grew stronger. Eventually, I secured a job at NRT Tech Park with a salary of INR 15,000. This journey taught me that with persistence and hard work, dreams can become reality.

IMPACT STORIES

» GSA Amaravathi: Gopichand Kumb

"With education, you can change your circumstances, and with support, you can change your story." – Malala Yousafzai



Gopichand Kumb from Lingamguntla village, Andhra Pradesh, embodies resilience and the power of education. Orphaned young, he was raised by his physically challenged grandmother, who supported him emotionally and financially with her pension. Gopichand studied through school and college, facing many hardships but never giving up on his dream.

In 2013, Chalice Sponsorship became a turning point, providing support that improved his household and education. After graduating, he completed a computer course in Bangalore, aiming for a career in IT or business. He hopes to start his own enterprise and sponsor a child someday, giving back the support that changed his life.



Vinela Yedla – GSP Khammam

I am Vinela Yedla from Baghatsingh Nagar Village. Growing up in a thatched house with parents as daily wage labourers, education felt out of reach. I studied by borrowed lamps and worked in fields to afford school. In 2013, the Good Shepherd Sisters sponsored me, transforming my life with education, health, and family support. During COVID-19, Chalice Canada helped my family with dry rations. I have now completed my B.Com in Computers and am preparing for bank coaching, aspiring to become a bank manager. I am proud and deeply grateful to my sponsors, the Sisters, and all who supported me.



» Staff Training on Child Safeguarding and Child Rights – CCSE Project, 27th & 28th October 2025



A two-day staff training on Child Safeguarding and Child Rights was held under the CCSE Project to enhance awareness and protection skills. The programme began with a prayer led by the Ouguri team and a welcome by Mr. Sanjay Barai, MDO Manager, who stressed that safeguarding children is a shared moral and professional duty. A tribute honoured the late Mr. Maria Louis Satyan for his contributions.

Sessions covered child safeguarding, abuse identification, reporting, and safe environments, guided by the Congregational Safeguarding Policy. Sr. Pushpa Louis and Sr. Kala explained child rights based on the UN Convention, the four pillars of child rights, safeguarding standards, and the 4 R's of safeguarding. Practical tools like risk assessment, context mapping, and action planning were introduced. Staff engaged in group discussions and created site-wise safeguarding and VCPCR action plans. The training deepened knowledge and reinforced that child protection is everyone's responsibility.

» EJ Project Staff Training on Cooperative Rural Business Management, 5th December 2025

A one-day staff training on Women's Multi-Purpose Cooperative Societies was conducted by Mr. Sanjay Barai and Sr. Kala. The Karjat team led a prayer to start the session. Mr. Sanjay explained the concept, purpose, governance, and registration process of cooperatives, highlighting livelihood initiatives supported by government schemes.

Sr. Kala covered governance, leadership, financial and risk management, and best practices. Participants engaged in group work, sharing progress, challenges, and strategies, and prepared action plans. The training equipped staff with practical knowledge and renewed commitment to support women-led cooperatives. Sr. Arockia Mary gave the vote of thanks, and Sr. Pushpa Louis distributed certificates.



STAFF CORNER

» Staff Training on Child Protection –MMG-CHIRAG Project (17 December 2025)



A staff training on Child Protection under the MMG-CHIRAG Project was held in Mangalagiri on 17 December 2025. It began with a pre-test on child rights completed by all participants. Sessions covered Understanding Child Rights (facilitated by the MDO Manager), Types of Abuse(Sr. Anto), and the Legal Framework for Child Protection in India(Sr. Vidhya). A group activity encouraged reflection on children's rights in communities.

Sr. Mercy presented the Province's Safeguarding Policy, highlighting the institution's responsibilities. Mr Sanjay led sessions on practical child protection, staff roles, and community awareness planning. Staff from Goa, Amaravathi, and Mangalagiri were actively engaged, gaining comprehensive knowledge and strengthening their commitment to child safety and rights.



» EJ Project Annual Review Meeting 6 December 2025, Good Shepherd Provincialate, Nagpur

The Annual Review Meeting of the EJ Project was held on 6 December 2025 at Good Shepherd Provincialate, Nagpur. The meeting began with a prayer by the Chainpur team and a welcome address by Mr Sanjay, MDO Manager. Site-wise presentations from Chainpur, Balaghat, Karjat, and Salem covered activities, achievements, challenges, and learnings for the period January–November 2025.



STAFF CORNER

The review highlighted strong staff commitment, effective coordination, and visible positive changes among women participants, particularly in confidence, leadership, savings practices, and participation in Gram Sabha and local governance. Key suggestions included focusing more on outcomes, documenting challenges

clearly, and using a common reporting format. Financial statements were reviewed, and guidance was provided on financial documentation. The meeting concluded with appreciation remarks, distribution of participation certificates, and a vote of thanks, marking the successful completion of the Annual Review Meeting.

➤ GS Toronto Child Protection Project Annual Review Meeting – 15 December 2025, Mangalagiri, Andhra Pradesh



The GS Toronto Child Protection Project Annual Review Meeting was held on 15 December 2025 at Good Shepherd Convent, Mangalagiri, with teams from Goa, Mangalagiri, and Amaravathi. The meeting reviewed annual progress, shared experiences, and strengthened child protection strategies. Each site presented reports covering activities such as awareness campaigns, training, and community engagement, highlighting achievements and challenges.

Financial transparency was ensured through expenditure reviews. Participants exchanged feedback and solutions, emphasising improved child protection, rights awareness, and community involvement. The meeting concluded with recommendations focusing on measurable outcomes, enhanced monitoring, and sustainability. This review reinforced the team's commitment to child rights and safety and set a clear roadmap for continued progress across all sites.
